And So Flows History: A Book by Hahn Moo-Sook

Hahn Moo-Sook (1918-1993) is one of Korea's most celebrated writers of modern realist literature. She received many awards for her writing, including the 1986 Grand Prix of the Republic of Korea Literature Award for her novel Encounter. *And So Flows History*, Hahn's first novel, received first prize in a 1947 contest organized by a major Korean newspaper.

And So Flows History (Yôksanûn hûrûnda, 1947) is a deeply compelling saga of love, jealously, honor, and greed, depicting the relentless power of exterior forces on the individual lives of three generations of the illustrious Cho family - from the waning years of the Choson dynasty in the late nineteenth century to the tumultuous postliberation era.

And So Flows History was translated from Korean into English by Young-Key Kim-Renaud, the eldest daughter of Hahn Moo-Sook. Professor Kim-Renaud is a theoretical linguist with broad interest in the humanities and Asian affairs. She has been the director of the Korean language and culture program at George Washington University since 1983. She is Chair of the East Asian Languages and Literatures Department and a faculty member of George Washington's Linguistics Program. She teaches all levels of Korean language and literature courses, and a course in Asian Humanities. Before joining GW, she worked as Assistant Program Director for Linguistics at the U.S. National Science Foundation (NSF). In 1986-87, she taught at Harvard University as a visiting lecturer. She is a past President of the International Circle of Korean Linguistics and of the Washington Linguistic Society. She is the Korea Book Review Editor for the Journal of Asian Studies, the Executive Editor of Korean Linguistics, and an Editor of the International Journal of Korean Studies.

National Adoption Information Clearinghouse Adoption Assistance Resource

A new resource on adoption assistance and post adoption information by State is now available on the National Adoption Information Clearinghouse website. Developed by the Association of Administrators of the Interstate Compact on Adoption and Medical Assistance and the American Public Human Services Association, the Adoption Assistance database allows users to select a State to view the answers to 13 questions regarding State policies on adoption assistance, or they can select a single question to find out how it is addressed across all States. The database include information about the fair hearing process, as well as contact information for key State personnel handling specific aspects of adoption assistance or post adoption services. Across the Loss: Adoptive Parents Speak to Korean Birth Parents

Have you ever wished you could address your child's Korean birth parents? Ever felt a need to express to them your thoughts, feelings, questions or even concerns about the adoption of your children? I have, and I'd like to invite you to join me and your fellow adoptive parents in sharing your thoughts.

I am an adoptive parent who, with this project, hopes to convey to the adoption community the range of emotions and real issues that touch all those who are involved in the adoption journey. Because this book will be published in paperback form in English and Korean, it will share heartfelt communication from adoptive parents to Korean birth parents, as well as enlighten adoption professionals and government officials here and abroad. It will be a very personal journey for adoptive parents, those who contribute to the project and those who read it.

Your thoughts might take the form of a letter to your child's birth parent(s), an essay, a poem, or a drawing. Some topics to consider might include parenting and attachment; role of birth parents in your child's and/or family's life; siblings - lost and/or gained; Korean culture and language in our lives; anticipation, arrival, and reality; joy and celebration; loss and grief; birth parent loss; the adoption triad; racism in America and its impact on our children; openness toward reunion.

The above topics are suggestions – feel free to write whatever is on your mind or in your heart. Written submissions should not exceed 1000 words. Your submission can be published anonymously if you desire. The deadline for submissions is January 31, 2006

"Across the Loss" is dedicated to my fellow adoptive parent and dear friend, Merrie Gilbert, who passed away unexpectedly in February 2005. Merrie and I first began to talk of this project after we had the opportunity to meet and speak with birth mothers at Ae Ran Won Home for Birthmothers in Seoul while our families visited Korea in 2001. CHINGOO is a group of undergraduate students at American University in Washington, DC, who have initiated a program to give young Korean adoptees (up to approximately age 6) a chance to experience Korean culture with "big brothers and sisters" who become one-on-one mentors. We are a mix of Korean American, Korean International and Korean Adoptee college students, ages 18-22. As the name CHINGOO, or "friend" implies, we hope to form irreplaceable bonds between ourselves, your family, and your child.

CHINGOO strives to provide adopted Korean children in the DC area with resources to expose them to Korean traditions, songs, games, stories, language, crafts, and people. We expect that this "big brother/sister" relationship will continue for years to come. Through both individual and group activities, CHINGOO will offer your child a nurturing environment in which to spend time with her/her mentor, family, and other same-age Korean adoptees.

The program also serves to develop awareness within the Korean student community at American University. Not only do fellow Korean students get to meet each other, but they are also given the opportunity to share their feelings and perspectives on Korean international adoption. CHINGOO hopes to provide the means by which everyone will bond and thrive to become a strong and connected community. There is a small fee for participating families to cover expenses.

She called the Bride over and asked how we ever got hanboks for the girls; when Hyunah told her we wanted to honor their culture and tradition, her mother cried and would not stop hugging me! She was initially so overwhelmed that she didn't even notice what they were wearing; it was priceless.

I cannot thank you all enough for everything: your incredible kindness and generosity, inviting a stranger into your very home! It was such a blessing to us and our family --- THANK YOU!!!!!!!!!!!!

Bone Marrow Registry – Please Help!

Please consider becoming a potential bone marrow donor and registering with the National Bone Marrow Donor Registry. The process is fairly simple; after filling out a short questionnaire, a small blood sample is taken. The Registry is open to anyone between the ages of 18 and 60 and is in good health.

I was adopted from Korea at a young age. Although I was able to locate my birth mother and some other relatives in Korea in 1997, many other international adoptees are not successful due to a myriad of reasons. As adoptees who do not know their biological families, family medical history is something of a myth and when fatal diseases such as leukemia arise it makes it even more difficult to find a matching donor for bone marrow transplants. The next step in locating a possible match is to find a donor with a similar ethnic background. However, Asians and other minority populations still only make up a small percentage of the National Marrow Donor Program Database. This is why we need your help and the help of your friends and families.

I registered to be a bone marrow donor on my 18th birthday in 1996 along with my older brother Ross, who is also adopted from Korea. At that time, a fellow Korean adoptee, Brian Baumann, was desperately seeking a donor to help him fight his battle against leukemia. Brian was able to use the Korean media to conduct searches in Korea since there was no match in the US. Brian was successful in finding a match and has been triumphant in his battle against leukemia. However, another fellow female adoptee from Minnesota was not so successful and passed away a few years ago because she was not able to locate biological family members, nor was she able to find a suitable match from other parties.



Korean Focus Honors Ted Kim with ESWS Sponsorship

Ted Kim, the founder of Adoption Service Information Agency (ASIA), retired this year after over 20 years of service. At February's Lunar New Year Celebration, Korean Focus honored Mr. Kim for his years of service to our families. In addition to a plaque expressing our thanks to Mr. Kim for his contributions to our families, we offered what we believe is a special tribute to someone whose life's work focused on the well-being of children: Sponsorship of a child at the Eastern Social Welfare Society school for handicapped children in Pyongtaek, South Korea.

Mr. Kim's sponsored child is Lee Sang-Hyeok, a nine year old boy at the elementary school for handicapped children in Pyongtaek. A recent update describes Sang-Hyeok as a mischievous little boy with an attractively bright smile, which his photos clearly shows. Sang-Hyeok likes to play with puzzles, blocks and balloons, but especially enjoys coloring with crayons. The progress report also says that Sang-Hyeok enjoys riding his bike and running, and also that he had a great time at a recent outing to the amusement park Everland. It also says that he is a curious boy who loves to talk to the other children about school activities, and that he is kind.

Sponsoring a child like Sang-hyeok is easy, and the benefits to ESWS and the sponsored children far outweigh any sacrifice we might make to assist in this way. In addition to sponsorship of a specific child, for which the sponsor will receive regular updates and photos of their sponsored child, ESWS offers other ways to support their work through regular donations and general sponsorships. Sponsorship pledges are paid via US check and sent directly to Eastern in Korea. The ESWS website describes all of these sponsorship opportunities in detail, and an online sponsorship application is also available there.
