### **President's Corner**

#### Happy New Year -

We'll be improving the newsletter by adding restaurant, book and movie reviews, in addition to information that you can use to maintain your links to Korean culture. 

# 2007 Korean Language Courses at KORUS House

KORUS House, the Information Service Center at the Embassy of Korea, is offering Korean language classes to the Washington, DC area community. Instructors are native speakers with extensive teaching experience. Korean courses for Winter 2007 consist of two levels for beginners without previous knowledge of Korean. Classes meet for 12 weeks on each Monday evening. Classes have a typical enrollment of 12 to 14 students. Tuition is non-refundable after the first week of classes. Registration is being accepted now until January 29, 2007.

Korean for Beginners: Level I & II

For those with little or no experience with Korean Mondays, 6 – 8 pm

February 5 – April 30, 12 week session

Textbook : Student Book 1 (Korean for Foreigners) Tuition : \$225 includes textbook and instructional

materials

#### **Course Descriptions**

Novice Beginning Level I Instructor: Dr. Younghi Ramsey

This course is designed for those who want to learn Korean from the very beginning. Students with non-Korean Heritage are suitable for the course. Each class session is focused on teaching Hangul vowels, consonants and spelling. Pronunciation, sentence structure, as well as basic grammatical patterns like particles and verb tenses are also taught. Korean I is offered as the prerequisite course to Korean II.

# Novice Beginning Level II Instructor: Dr. Young A Jung

This course is a continuation of Level I and also called 'Survival Korea.' The course places primary emphasis on oral (speaking and listening) skills, expanding on basic grammar skills, vocabulary, irregular verbs, and 'informal' speech patterns. Additionally, through class works, students will develop broader understanding and appreciation for Korean culture. At the conclusion of Level II, students will be able to comprehend and use basic Korean such as simple greeting, self-introductions and essential everyday expressions.

What is Korea's most significant contribution to the history of art? An art historian would probably answer, "Ceramics." If you wanted to learn about Korean ceramics, though, you'd have a tough time finding anything that isn't meant for graduate students; forget about anything for kids! The Newbery book, A Single Shard, with a great story, and an informative appendix, is actually a good place to start.

But, let's learn more about Korean ceramics by making them. We'll decorate pots with real Korean and Korea-related designs. We'll have stamps, stencils, lots of pictures, and a short (but fascinating) lecture to inspire you. You'll learn to recognize the classic Korean ceramic colors, shapes and patterns.

### New Year Message from Ambassador Lee Tae-Sik

Following is an excerpt from the 2007 New Year message from Ambassador Lee Tae-Sik to Korean Americans



#### Dear Respected Koreans in the U.S.

Korean-American communities have earned high approbations and we

can witness their esteem grow year after year. Furthermore, it is an encouraging sign for the community that in the November 2006 mid-term election, more Korean-Americans have been involved in the political process. Thus, it goes without saying that further involvement in the American political process is needed in order to further gain recognition and have stronger voice in the American mainstream society. Korean-American communities can no longer remain apathetic and aloof. Ergo, I urge all of you to further involve in the political process at your local elections.

The issue of Inter-generation cooperation in the Korean-American community is another urgent matter. I hope that the community leaders and members can work to close the gap between the generations by opening the doors and renovating participation process to further include the new generation in the community activities. I also urge the next generation to not lose your identity as Koreans and inherit the foundations of your previous generation to use them as your springboard for your future.

Therefore, in 2007, I urge you to keep up your effort in elevating the prestige and prominence of the Korean-American community. I firmly believe that the community's bright future for the 21st century can only be secured when you gain respect and recognition from the mainstream American society through your various active participations.

The Embassy staff and I will tirelessly work to achieve such goal for the Korean-American community in America and also back in Korea. We will continue to improve our consulate services to provide more convenient and efficient services. Concurrently, we will work harder to bring the community closer to Korea. Furthermore, we will work behind the scenes to seek closer attention and support from your local and federal governments in the United States.

The upcoming New Year is the year of the "red pig" that comes in every 60 years. Traditionally, pigs symbolize fortune; and the "red pig" represents bigger fortune. Therefore, I wish all of you and your families happiness in this auspicious year of the "red pig."

# Year of the Red Pig

In Korea, there are 12 animals that each year is named after. They are the rat, the cow, the tiger, the rabbit, the dragon, the snake, the horse, the sheep, the monkey, the rooster, the dog, and the pig. 2007 will be the year of the pig.

Usually the pig is symbolized as laziness and greed. However, in Korean history the pig is considered a lucky animal, bringing good health and property. Every 60 years, a special year of the pig occurs — the year of the red pig. 2007 is such a year. It is said that a baby who is born in the year of the red pig will have lots of property.

Koreans recognize the solar and lunar new years. On January 1 of the solar calendar, some businesses close to mark the occasion. Seollal, the lunar new year, is a national holiday on which businesses close and families celebrate together.

She has worked with the Center for Adoption Support and Education (C.A.S.E.) doing educational and post-adoption work, including groups for adopted children and adoptive families. More recently, Michelle was with The Barker Foundation's Korean adoption program and post-adoption department.

Michelle has been with Korea Homeland Tours since 2002 as a social worker, and has also traveled to Korea as a participant in a homeland tour for adult adoptees and with The Barker Foundation.

Michelle's plans for Korea Homeland Tours include the addition of a tour for adult adoptees and the continuation of Korea Homeland Tours' long-standing family tours. KHT's adult adoptee tour differs from other adoptee tours in that family and friends are welcome. Many other adult tours permit only adoptees to travel, which often means that adoptees must travel without their families, including spouses and "significant others."
